Brief Bio of Rudy Wiebe;

Rudy Wiebe was born in the northern community of Fairholm, Saskatchewan. After studying at the University of Alberta, and editing the Mennonite Brethren publication, *The MB Herald*, he launched into a career of writing that netted him two Governor General's awards. His first book, *Peace Shall Destroy* shot him into prominence. His writings on Chief Big Bear, showed his immense understanding of events surrounding First Nations and European peoples more than 125 years ago. Wiebe has taught at Goshen College and at the University of Alberta. He has also received the Order of Canada award.
